

Everyday, our teachers are shaping young minds and guiding children through their most formative years with patience, intention, and deep care. It takes a truly special person to do this work, and I am constantly in awe of the dedication, love, and professionalism that our team brings into the classroom.

This year, our commitment to excellence in early learning was affirmed through our strong CLASS scores, an achievement that speaks volumes about the quality of interactions happening each day within our walls.

For those unfamiliar, CLASS (the Classroom Assessment Scoring

System) is a nationally recognized tool used to assess the quality of teacher-child interactions. It doesn't look at what's on the walls or how many toys are in the classroom. Instead, it measures what matters most: the ways in which educators connect with children, their learning, and create a safe, nurturing environment that supports healthy emotional and cognitive development. CLASS evaluates three key domains: emotional support, classroom organization, and instructional support, each essential to the social and academic success of young children.

CLASS is measured on a 7-point rating scale, and we are proud

to share that our center scored a 5.46, a score that reflects the genuine warmth, consistency, and intentionality our teachers bring into the classroom every day.

lesson plans and routines, it's a work of heart.

Why does this matter? Because children's brains are developing at lightning speed during the early years. In fact, 90% of a child's brain development occurs before the age of five. During this time, the relationships children form with their caregivers—especially their teachers—help build the foundation for all future learning. The tone of a voice, the consistency of routines, the encouragement to try something new, the support through big emotions—these moments are not small. They're everything.



Our high CLASS score is a direct reflection of the intentional work our educators put in to ensure every child feels seen, heard, and supported. This year, our team has focused heavily on strengthening small group instruction—an essential component of quality early learning that allows teachers to hone in on each child's unique strengths, needs, and learning styles. This work, paired with our dedication to social-emotional

learning, has had a profound impact.

We're proud to share that 84% of our students met kindergarten readiness benchmarks this year, a number that places us above the state average and showcases the effectiveness of our whole-child approach. But beyond that percentage are real children with growing confidence, curiosity, and compassion, ready to take on the world one question, one friendship, and one

new experience at a time.

We are proud. We are grateful. And we are committed to continuous growth. As we reflect on these accomplishments, we know that none of this would be possible without the heart of our school: our educators, our families, and you, our supporters. Thank you for believing in the power of early childhood education done with excellence and heart.

Inside the Classroom:



FROG STREET PRE-K curriculum is a comprehensive, duallanguage program designed to meet the needs of diverse learners while supporting developmental learning domains. This engaging, interactive pre-kindergarten curriculum celebrates the joy of learning as children travel down the road to success.



FROG STREET THREES provides intentional instruction in key areas of development so children ages 36-48 months can effectively continue the path to kindergarten readiness. This curriculum has well-rounded activities developed around early brain development research, addressing all development domains. It includes social and emotional emphasis through Conscious Discipline.



FROG STREET TODDLER nurtures curiosity through exploration. It focuses on enhancing the simple joy of childhood while equipping parents to nurture curiosity through exploration. This program is specially created for children ages eighteen to thirty-six months. The activities center around five development domains; differentiated instruction to meet the needs of all learners. It is designed with intention and purpose to move children forward in their development.

HEAD START & EARLY HEAD START PROGRAMS HSELC contracted with the Agricultural and Labor Program Inc. (ALPI) to provide educational services to Head Start and Early Head Start families. Research has proven how important these formative early years are for children's later successes in school and life. This partnership removes the financial barrier many families face when considering an early childhood education for their children and helps to build the foundations needed to perform academically on their grade level.

Head Start programs support children's growth in a positive learning environment through a variety of services, which include early learning and development, health and family well-being. The child's entire family, as well as the community, is involved to create a quality program and assist the child with school readiness.



Programs with Purpose

INSPIRING GROWTH AND LEARNING



ArtReach

The center's art program under the guidance and leadership of the Lighthouse Gallery, in Tequesta, engages children's imagination in the world of art. The ArtReach program offers children weekly interactive art instruction and materials to inspire their creative spirit. This program is generously sponsored by the Hobe Sound Community Chest!

Music Together® Class

This in-school curriculum raises the overall quality of a child's education by touching crucial factors all at once: school readiness, family engagement, parent-child relationships, and teacher professional development. When Music Together is a part of the school day, music is not just fun – it is a powerful learning tool, too! *This program is generously sponsored by the Hobe Sound Community Chest!*

Small Group Instruction

Our certified educator works directly with VPK students in small groups based on their skill levels to provide extra learning opportunities. Small group instruction has been a key factor in our success with students who are struggling with School Readiness Skills.



Parent Empowerment Workshops

These classes are "life changing" and help parents deepen their connection to their children and foster self-love, responsibility, resiliency and self-esteem. They provide young parents the tools they need to create a safe, peaceful & supportive environment in their home. We are enthusiastic about making these workshops available to all parents.

Technology

Classrooms were provided with tablets to help guide children through learning technology skills sets & utilize interactive programming to be prepared for kindergarten. Our VPK and 3-year-old students participated in Whiz Kids Inc. during the 2024-2025 school year. Technology and computer training for preschoolers offers necessary skills that contribute to their overall development and preparedness for school.

Fitness Program

The Center partnered with Hobe Sound Soccer Club to provide students with opportunities to participate in soccer. The program teaches students teamwork, communication, sportsmanship, confidence, coordination and gross motor skills.

Bi-Lingual Program

Bi-lingual educators and staff open the lines of communication and prepare students to be fully engaged, informed, and aids in their achieving a level of inclusiveness that enhances their lives.

Healthy Meals with Community Partner

Every day, we provide a healthy breakfast, a warm & nutritious lunch and wholesome snacks to all children attending our Center. All meals are prepared by the Boys & Girls Clubs of Martin County and meet the daily nutritional recommendations for children one-five years of age.

Voluntary Prekindergarten (VPK) was established in Florida following the passage of a constitutional amendment in 2002, and was officially signed into law by Governor Jeb Bush on January 2, 2005. This landmark program was designed to ensure that every four-year-old in Florida has access to high-quality early education, setting the stage for long-term academic success. Hobe Sound Early Learning Center (HSELC) has proudly offered VPK since its inception.

To further support our VPK students, HSELC developed a robust small group instruction program tailored to meet each child's unique needs. Through differentiated activities and personalized instruction, students receive focused attention that deepens their understanding and strengthens their readiness

skills. This targeted approach builds a lasting educational foundation that benefits children well beyond preschool.

The VPK school-year program includes 540 instructional hours. Research shows that children who attend VPK demonstrate enhanced language development, greater independence, stronger social skills, and improved performance on school readiness assessments.

At HSELC, all VPK students participate in pre- and post-assessments to measure growth throughout the year. The results from the 2024–2025 school year highlight not only the critical importance of VPK in preparing children for kindergarten, but also the unwavering commitment of our educators to nurturing each child's development and potential.



The excitement was contagious as our VPK students arrived dressed in their finest—bow ties, sparkly dresses, big smiles, and even bigger energy. Our first inaugural VPK Prom was more than just a celebration; it was a joyful sendoff for a group of young learners who have grown, explored, and blossomed together throughout the year.



Looking Ahead To our TO OUR TOUCH

In early summer 2025, the Hobe Sound Early Learning Center officially adopted a new strategic plan—an ambitious and thoughtful roadmap designed to guide the Center through its next chapter of growth, excellence, and service to the Hobe Sound community. Developed through months of collaboration between the Board of Directors and Center leadership, the plan focuses on three core priorities: capital improvements, financial stability, and center enrichment.

At the heart of this work is HSELC's steadfast mission: to provide families, regardless of income, an affordable early-education program incorporating nurturing, education and recreation to stimulate their children's healthy emotional and social development and help them to excel in school and life.

According to Board Co-President John Boyer, the strategic plan is more than a list of goals—it's a deeply considered reflection of HSELC's values. "This plan represents a unified commitment to strengthening every aspect of the Center—from the buildings where our children learn and grow, to the financial foundation that ensures long-

term sustainability, to the exceptional educators and programs that make HSELC a cornerstone of the Hobe Sound

community," said Boyer. "The Board was fully engaged in this process, and we're proud of what it represents."

Led by the Board of Directors, the strategic planning process involved asking important questions about the Center's direction, sustainability, and potential. From the outset, the Board worked in close partnership with Head of School Ashley Azzi, Director of Development Rachel Sheperd, Director of Finance Petra Pitkonen, and other members of the leadership team to conduct a thorough evaluation of the Center's current state and long-term needs.

"The Board's role wasn't just to approve

this plan—we were active participants in shaping it," said Board Co-President Steve Bartram. "We wanted to ensure that our strategic priorities were realistic, measurable, and aligned with both our mission and the day-to-day operations of the Center."

In addition to the strategic plan itself, the Board also approved a complementary strategic financial plan. This financial framework outlines how the Center will support its goals through disciplined budgeting, reserve fund targets, and clear fundraising priorities—ensuring that progress is not only aspirational, but achievable.

"This isn't aspirational—it's operational," added Bartram. "The financial planning work ensures we're not just dreaming big, but delivering responsibly."

A major element of the strategic plan is a renewed focus on capital investment in the Center's facilities. While HSELC has served generations of families with pride, its campus needs upgrades to meet evolving safety standards and modern learning environments. To that end, the Center will engage third-party consulting firms to conduct land studies, prepare a campaign planning study, and develop a donor engagement strategy to fund these improvements. A comprehensive facilities assessment will evaluate the current classroom spaces and prioritize future renovations based on safety, educational impact, and cost-efficiency.

"Our goal is to build a physical environment that matches the strength of our programming," said Ashley Azzi, Head of School. "We're creating spaces where children feel safe and inspired, and where teachers can thrive professionally."

The plan also establishes clear measures to ensure long-term financial stability, with Director of Finance Petra Pitkonen playing a central role in its execution. Working alongside the Board's Finance Committee and administrative leadership, Pitkonen is implementing new budgeting protocols, reserve fund policies, and a review of the Center's financial assistance structure to make sure it remains equitable, sustainable, and aligned with the Center's mission.

"We're building a financial model that reflects our values while positioning the Center for responsible growth," said Pitkonen. "That means asking smart questions, evaluating how we use proceeds from events like our annual Chili Cookoff, and developing a structure that provides stability and flexibility."



Boyer praised Pitkonen's leadership in translating strategic goals into financial systems. "Petra brings clarity, discipline, and strategic thinking to every conversation. Her leadership will be essential in ensuring we meet our goals without compromising our fiscal health."

The plan also calls for meaningful investment in what makes HSELC truly special: its teachers programs. A renewed commitment programmatic enrichment to includes investigating formal accreditation, expanding scholarship professional development opportunities for teachers, and funding innovative initiatives designed by the staff to enhance learning and classroom experience.

"Our teachers are on the front lines of what we do every day," said Azzi. "We want them to feel empowered and supported in bringing forward ideas that can elevate learning."

Rachel Sheperd, Director of Development, sees the plan as a vital tool for engagement and donor confidence. "This plan gives us the structure and clarity we need to connect with donors in a meaningful way," she said. "We can point to specific initiatives—capital improvements, teacher development, scholarships—and say, 'This is what your gift will do'. That's a powerful message."

Sheperd noted that the plan also reinforces the Center's reputation as a serious, well-run organization with a long-term vision. "Donors want to invest in places that are thinking about the future. This shows them that HSELC is prepared, focused, and ready."

Now that the plan has been formally adopted, the focus shifts to execution. The Board will maintain strategic oversight, ensuring the Center stays aligned with its stated goals and guiding principles. At the same time, the Board stands ready to support Azzi and the senior administrative team in carrying out the plan's initiatives. The next phase will be a hybrid effort—one that blends the strategic direction of the Board with the daily leadership, creativity, and problem-solving of HSELC's talented staff.

"This is a long-term commitment," said Bartram. "The process doesn't end with a vote—it begins with action. We're confident in our team, and we're here to support them as they lead the way forward."

With clarity of purpose, a strong team in place, and a community of supporters standing behind it, Hobe Sound Early Learning Center is well positioned for what's next

Beyond the data, her success shines through in the strong, trusting relationships she builds with families—resulting in exceptional parent satisfaction and a supportive environment where children thrive.

Outside the classroom, Brandy continues to uplift and empower her peers, reminding us all of the importance of teamwork and shared purpose. Her positivity and unwavering dedication are felt across the Center every day.

Connecting Cause

Our center is deeply committed to supporting the whole child, and that includes ensuring every student has access to early intervention services when needed. Through strong partnerships with community agencies like FDLRS (Florida Diagnostic and Learning Resources System) and Early Steps, we're able to connect families with vital developmental support at the earliest and most impactful stages.

FDLRS provides comprehensive screening and evaluation services for children ages 3 and up who may be experiencing developmental delays or challenges. When a child qualifies, they may receive a range of specialized services—including speech and language therapy, occupational therapy, and behavioral support—some of which can be scheduled here on our campus during the school day. This seamless integration ensures children receive the help they need in a familiar, supportive environment without disruption to their daily routine. These early interventions are crucial, as research shows that identifying and addressing developmental concerns in the preschool years leads to better outcomes academically, socially, and emotionally.

For children under age 3, we work closely with Early Steps, Florida's early intervention program for infants and toddlers. This agency offers evaluations and, if needed, in-home or center-based therapies for young children with developmental delays. By partnering with Early Steps, we are able to support our youngest learners and their families as early as possible—laying the foundation for long-term success. These partnerships reflect our belief that

early intervention is not just a service—it's a lifeline, giving children the tools, they need to thrive and families the support they deserve.

Through the *Help Me Behave* program offered by **Helping People Succeed**, students at Hobe Sound Early Learning Center receive targeted support in developing positive behaviors. Specialists partner not only with teachers but also with families to observe, identify, and address behavior patterns that may be impacting a child's success. By providing consistent strategies for both home and school, this program fosters self-regulation, cooperation, and problem-solving skills, creating a strong foundation for learning and growth.

Another trusted partner, **Tykes & Teens**, brings additional expertise in supporting children's social-emotional and behavioral needs. Their licensed therapists collaborate with teachers and families to create individualized plans that may include counseling, emotional regulation strategies, and behavioral interventions. This comprehensive approach ensures that each child's unique needs are met, helping them build the confidence, resilience, and emotional skills necessary to thrive in school and beyond.

on the Road to Leavening

At our Center, we believe that strong family engagement is the foundation of early childhood success—and that begins with access. Our unique bus transportation system breaks down barriers for families who lack reliable transportation by providing daily rides. Our bus provides transportation for both parents and children in the morning and afternoon, giving families the opportunity to stay connected with teachers, stay informed about their child's day, and remain actively involved-regardless of transportation or work schedule challenges. With flexible pickup times in both the mornings and afternoon, our routes can accommodate working parents who need to leave early, as well as those with later schedules or multiple children. This added flexibility ensures that all families have reliable access to our center in a way that supports their unique needs.

Additionally, our bus provides afternoon transportation for students attending Hobe Sound Elementary School, offering a critical support

for families who may otherwise face challenges. Beyond the school day, the bus is also available to our families for transportation to medical appointments, school functions, and community resource events, reinforcing our commitment to removing barriers and ensuring every family has access to the support and opportunities they need to thrive.

At the heart of this system is our beloved bus driver, Mr. Jorge, a retired police officer and war veteran who has been a part of our center for three years. His calm presence, dedication, and commitment to service extend far beyond the wheel. His daily interactions help foster a sense of safety, consistency, and connection for every family on board. This transportation program is more than a convenience—it's a powerful expression of our commitment to the families of Hobe Sound. By eliminating transportation barriers, we open doors for deeper family engagement, educational continuity, and a stronger, more connected community.

Conscious Discipline







We are proud to implement Conscious Discipline as our socialemotional learning framework. More than just a curriculum, Conscious Discipline is a relationship-based, trauma-informed approach that equips both children and adults with the tools to build emotional intelligence, self-regulation, and healthy connections. It is woven into every part of our daily routine, creating a school-wide culture of safety, compassion, and resilience.

One of the key components of Conscious Discipline is recognizing the three brain states—survival, emotional, and executive—and responding to children based on their current state. Teachers are trained to identify these states and guide children through them using co-regulation strategies that build trust and teach lifelong skills. Every classroom features a Safe Place, a cozy, inviting area designed for children to practice calming strategies like deep breathing, muscle relaxation, and visual cues. Rather than using time-outs or exclusionary discipline, children are supported in identifying their feelings and learning how to regulate them in a developmentally appropriate way. Teachers model empathy, use connected language, and guide children through conflict resolution using tools like the Time Machine, I-Statements, and the Five Steps to Self-Regulation.

To ensure fidelity and deepen our collective knowledge, staff members are sent to week-long Conscious Discipline trainings throughout the year. These intensive experiences allow teachers and administrators to dive deeper into the methodology, reflect on their own emotional responses, and bring back best practices to share with their teams. As a result, Conscious Discipline is not just something we do—it's something we live every day. It shows how we interact with children, collaborate with families, and support one another as professionals. Through this commitment, we are building a school culture where emotional safety is prioritized, positive relationships are nurtured, and every child is seen, valued, and empowered.


